What is a School Resource Officer (SRO)?

Many people know that a SRO is deployed in a school system to provide a safe learning environment for students and staff, but did you know that this position provides a multitude of other services and benefits beyond just security?

Fredericktown Police Department Chief of Police Kyle Johnson is a strong proponent of the "triad concept" to define the three main roles of a school resource officer: educator (i.e. guest lecturer), informal counselor/mentor, and law enforcement officer.

Fredericktown Police Department Officer Ronny Flynn is deployed at the Fredericktown Local Schools (FLS) as a School Resource Officer. Chief Johnson recently remarked that, "SRO Ronny Flynn does a tremendous job of balancing all of these roles on a daily basis at Fredericktown Local Schools." Chief Johnson went on to say that he frequently visits the school to monitor SRO Flynn in the performance of his duties and it is clear to him that Flynn is making a positive impact as evidenced by the positive interactions that he observes between SRO Flynn and FLS students and staff. Chief Johnson stated that he is, "Confident that the SRO position is making a positive impact, not only at FLS, but the Fredericktown community as a whole. If we are building a positive law enforcement relationship with our youth population now, just imagine how valuable that will be as they become the adults of our community."

Nuisance Ordinance Violations

The Fredericktown Police Department issued 39 Nuisance Ordinance Violation letters to residents throughout the Village in 2019. The violations were related to; high grass, trash, construction debris, furniture, appliances, inoperable vehicles, etc. A large majority of the residents receiving these notices abated the violations immediately.

Visible signs of crime and disorder create an environment that fosters further and more serious crimes. We are committed to enforcing nuisance ordinance violations to not only ensure an improved quality of life in our neighborhoods but to also promote crime prevention efforts.

2019 Training

Fredericktown Police Officers completed 410 hours of training in 2019, at a cost of \$1,565. This equates to approximately 68 hours of continuing professional education per officer.

These training costs are minimal in comparison to the total training hours received and this is due to the police department taking advantage of free training provide by the Ohio Attorney General's Office and other various organizations.

Equipment

Thanks to grant funding from the Ohio Attorney General's Office, the Fredericktown Police Department was able to purchase new body armor vests in 2019. While these vests are an unseen portion of our daily uniform, they play a vital role in providing safety to our officers. Pictured with the new vests is Ptl. Josh Jones.



Also, this year we were able to purchase a radar sign. This is a very effective speed deterrent for our neighborhood streets. Not only does this sign provide immediate feedback to vehicle operators but it will also store traffic data which will allow us the opportunity to analyze traffic flow patterns to aid in speed enforcement.



Capital Improvements

A 3-bay garage was added to the east side of the Fredericktown Police Department building in 2019. This addition will allow for our cruisers to be out of the weather which means a longer life expectancy for each vehicle. This also equates to quicker response times during emergencies in inclement weather, as the cruiser windows will be free of snow and ice.



Drug Task Force

The Fredericktown Police Department continues to be an active member of the METRICH Drug Task Force.

Task Force Purpose and Mission:

- To improve the quality of life for the citizens of the METRICH region by reducing the availability of illegal drugs and weapons through community partnerships; promoting safe, secure neighborhoods.
- Funding
 - Grant funding obtained by the METRICH Task Force provides the Fredericktown Police Department with the opportunity to obtain equipment and funding necessary for drug enforcement investigations.

Home and Business Security Assessment

A Home and Business Security Assessment completed by the Fredericktown Police Department is designed to help homeowners, business owners, operators and staff to assess the overall security of their home and business. It covers potential areas of vulnerability, and provides suggestions for adapting your security to reduce the risk of crime and lessen liability.

The security assessment can be tailored to fit the needs of your home or particular business and will be conducted by a Fredericktown PD Officer who is certified by the Ohio Crime Prevention Association as a Crime Prevention Specialist. Active Intruder Training

The Fredericktown Police Department currently has 3 officers that are certified to Instruct school staff & students on the principles of ALICE, "ALERT, LOCKDOWN, INFORM, COUNTER, EVACUATE", in the event of an Active Intruder, Active Shooter or Active Killer situation. We collaborate with the Danville & Mt. Vernon Police Departments, Knox County Sheriff's Office, Knox County Emergency Management Agency, Fredericktown EMS and the Ohio State Highway Patrol to provide ALICE training to all schools throughout Knox County.

Due to the increase in active killer events, Knox County Law Enforcement also provides "Run, Hide, Fight" training for local businesses, group, organization and churches.



National Drug Take Back Days

Annually the Fredericktown Police Department participates in the National Drug Take Back Days in April and October. Each year several pounds of unused, unwanted and/or expired prescription drugs are dropped off at the police department for proper disposal. This initiative greatly lessens the potential for abuse and addiction. We are also equipped with a secure drug drop box in the police department lobby which is available for 24 / 7 / 365 drop off of unwanted medications.
